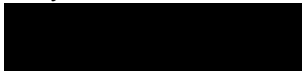

Dear Mr. Barrow:

Your real estate broker license number 612293 was issued to you on April 7, 2011, by the Texas Real Estate Commission ("Commission").

The Commission has verified that you were convicted of the felony offense of conspiring to possess with intent to distribute a quantity of cocaine on or about March 6, 2014. You were sentenced to 24 months in prison and your sentence began on or about March 29, 2014.

Pursuant to §53.021(b) of the Texas Occupations Code and in accordance with the Opinion No. GA-0064 of the Attorney General of Texas, your license is automatically revoked by operation of law at the time of your incarceration. Therefore, the Commission has revoked your salesperson license effective the date your incarceration began.

Should you wish to reapply for your license, you may submit an application for a real estate license to the Commission after your release from prison. The Commission cannot consider an application for a real estate license while a person is imprisoned.

If you apply for a license upon your release from prison, the Commission will review your application applying the criteria enumerated in Chapter 53 of the Texas Occupations Code, as well as criteria enumerated in §541.1 of the Rules of the Commission. If the Commission determines that it will deny your request for a real estate license, you will be informed of your rights under the law, and may pursue those accordingly.

You no longer hold a license to conduct the business of real estate. Conducting the business of real estate without a license is a violation of §1101.351(a) of the Texas Occupations Code, and may result in an administrative penalty of \$5,000.00 per violation per day. Conducting the business of real estate without a license is also a Class A misdemeanor criminal offense punishable by a fine and/or imprisonment.

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By copy of this letter, we inform the broker who was sponsoring your license and remind this broker that it is a violation of §§ 1101.652(b)(11) & (26) of the Texas Occupations Code to pay a commission or a fee to a person other than a license holder for compensation for services as a real estate agent or to associate with the same.
